Pre-Shoot Preparation

Goal:

The goal of this task is to create two different portrait styles: one that follows an organizational aesthetic, and the other that takes a more creative approach. This means carrying out a planned approach for each style, which includes preparation, execution, and post-processing, in order to produce portraits that meet the requirements of professionalism and creativity.

Overview of equipment preparation (camera, settings, lighting):

In order to get the desired results, it can be helpful to optimize the tools that are going to be used, such as an iPhone camera, sunlight lamp, and clear plastic bag, when preparing equipment for professional and creative portrait photography. Making sure that the iPhone is charged, clean, and set with the right apps and settings. Adjusting the brightness and direction of the sunlight lamp to create a flattering light by positioning it accordingly.

On-Site Shooting Process

Professional Portrait: The posture ought to portray a sense of competence and trust in professional portraits. Most people have a straight, upright pose with relaxed but not slouched shoulders. A small smile communicates approachability without coming across as overly serious. The idea is to portray in a way that reflects professionalism and competence while remaining calm and welcoming.

Creative Portrait: This type of photography allows for expression and experimentation. For this look, I thought about including a distinctive prop, such as a clear plastic item, to give the composition depth and an appealing appearance. Hold the plastic slightly in front of the face so that parts of facial features will show through the slight rip in the middle. Trying several poses and angles, trying to interact with the camera or trying different gazes to improve the portrait's creative expression.

Post-processing

Overview

For the professional portrait I decided to use the PicsArt app on my phone, retouching the background and color correcting some of the darker spots and areas on the face area. Adjusting the brightness as well as cropping some of the image to not have the background taking most of the space in the picture.

The creative picture I decided to add a prop to the shoot which was a plastic bag, I had an image in my head which is included in the moodboard that inspired me to use this. Putting it over my head to partially blur out the face, playing around with the lights and trying out multiple different poses. Ultimately I had one of the pictures that I decided to use for this assignment. Some of the editing I used was adjusting the brightness, colors, tones and some blur effects, creating the end result of the creative portrait.
